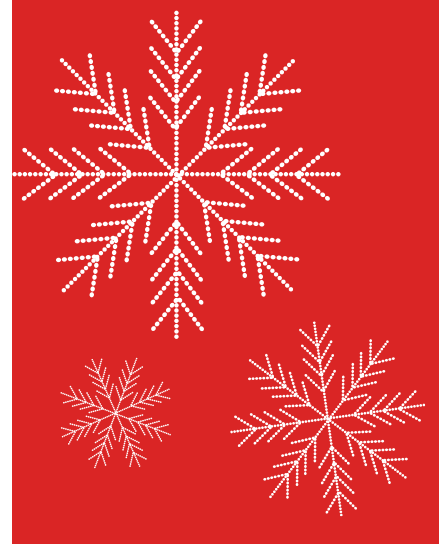
## Siksika Housing Home Maintenance Workshops

# Community Engagement Meeting for the Siksika Nation Memorial Hall Project, Previously Known as the Parish Hall

On November 13, 2024, a community engagement meeting was held for Siksika Nation, bringing together community members, Elders, artists, and Knowledge Keepers to discuss the planned development of the new building, previously known as the Parish Hall. The meeting was a key part of the ongoing collaboration between Siksika Nation and HATCH Limited, who are leading the design and community engagement process for this significant project.

The session, organized by HATCH Engagement Lead Farrah Ali Khan, also featured the active involvement of Hoss Yaquob, Lead for Siksika Engineering Services, highlighting the Nation's dedication to ensuring the project's success.

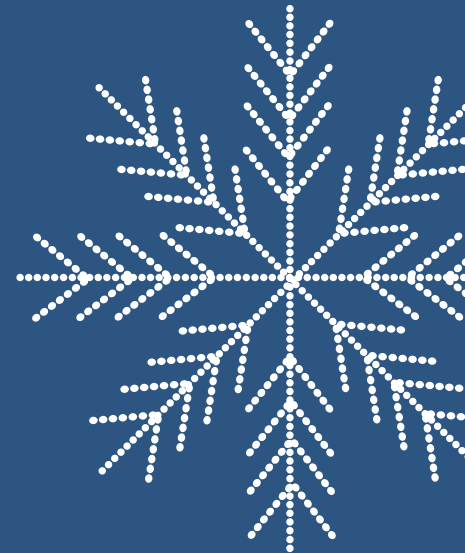
Held near Cluny, Alberta, west of Highway 842 and south of Township Road 220, the meeting followed earlier discussions, including an Elders Advisory Group meeting held in October. Attendees of the November 13 session were encouraged to share their perspectives on the building's design, purpose, and cultural identity. The meeting included presentations on the project's current status and its three-phase

timeline, spanning pre-design and concept design, construction, and post-construction.

Hoss Yaquob, representing Siksika Engineering Services, emphasized the importance of community input in shaping a project that aligns with the Nation's needs and vision.

During the meeting, HATCH representatives and Siksika Engineering Services provided updated concepts for the building's design, fostering a collaborative dialogue with attendees. This open discussion ensured that the project's direction remained rooted in the values and aspirations of the Siksika Nation.

The public engagement meeting exemplified the collaborative effort between Siksika Nation, its members, and project partners like HATCH. By prioritizing community involvement, the project ensures that the new Parish Hall will be a space that reflects the culture, values, and aspirations of the Nation. This ongoing dialogue is essential in creating a meaningful and functional space that serves the Siksika people for generations to come.



# Blackfoot Crossing Hosts Important Gathering Between Alberta and the Blackfoot Confederacy

Chief Roy Fox of the Kainai Nation (Blood Tribe), and Chairman Rodney Gervais of the Blackfeet Tribe from Montana. Alberta's Honorable Rick Wilson, Minister of Indigenous Relations, and Premier Danielle Smith were also present, demonstrating their commitment to working alongside the Blackfoot people.

We extend our heartfelt thanks to Eldon Weasel Child, who guided the meeting as chair, and Elder Herman Yellow Old Woman, who opened with a moving prayer that set a thoughtful tone for the

day. A special thank you goes to Shannon Bear Chief, Executive Director of Blackfoot Crossing, for her welcoming words and opening remarks.

The Annual Protocol Agreement meeting was a meaningful day of dialogue, bringing together leaders who share a vision of respect, cooperation, and a strong future for all. We were honored to host such a gathering and look forward to seeing continued progress through these valuable conversations.

After the opening ceremony, which included introductions and a prayer, respected members of the Nation, including Chief and Council

members, gave speeches reflecting on the purpose of the building, its role, and the successes of the peace officers.

Lou Ann Solway, one of the event speakers, shared her thoughts on the history of Siksika's cultural peacekeeping through the Society members of the "Brave Dogs." She also reflected on the work

# Siksika Justice Courtroom Opens in New Operating Format

On November 8<sup>th</sup> 2024, Siksika Justice reopened their doors to the public for their new court room layout and format. In attendance alongside Siksika Justice, Aiskapiimohkiiks Staff and Elders Advisory, were Councillors Louann Solway, Ike Solway, Samuel Crowfoot, Justice Karen Crowshoe, Justice George Gaschler. Also in attendance was some of the Chief Justices Derek Redmond, Jim Hunter and lastly a special appearance by the Minister of Justice Mickey Amery. The new format was years in the making and plans began in 2019 to begin renovations and was set to mirror that of the Indigenous Court in Calgary, where there is also a round table format. A format that was first introduced in 2019 but has deep rooted indigenous justice traditions that go far back. This incorporation allows the

Judge to no longer sit on a high court bench as they will sit on the same level as the public. The goal for the new layout is that it will create a sense of inclusion for our community members who attend



court. According to statistics with Siksika Justice, there has been drop in court matters resulting in guilty pleas, as more Restorative Justice approaches are incorporated. This new format's hope is to encourage community members to face their matters within a court process that

doesn't feel so intimidating. One of the benefits of dealing with court matters on reserve is that the system allows our members not only to feel safe but heard as the department offers a range of programs for self-improvement. It is important to our community that we incorporate all our values and traditions in everything we do and no matter the situation there are options for all involved. These programs are funded and are overseen by Alberta Justice, who also funded the renovations to make this system a reality. The symbolism of the circle was taken into great consideration for this concept even having the table custom made for the court room. "Like in a tipi when everyone sits in the circle it creates a sense of respect and safety for everyone in the circle." Tracy Many Heads—Siksika Justice Supervisor

# Indian Relay Racer, Star, and Student

Logan Red Crow is a proud Black-foot woman who is from the Siksika Nation. Her parents are Jayme Big Snake and Allison Red Crow. Her grandparents are the late Gordon and Christine Big Snake, and also the late Emily Three Suns and Clarence Red Crow. A big part of Logan's life is relay racing, Logan races for the team "Old Sun" that was created by her father, Allison Red Crow. Logan is also the star of the documentary "Aitamaako'tamisskapi Natosi - Before the Sun," a film that features the "Old Sun" relay team and her journey to racing in the women's Indian relay, which was first introduced in 2019 in the U.S.A.

Logan's racing career began at the age of 15 in the single lap ladies horse races, from the approach of her mom. Three years later, as the ladies relay event was introduced to the United States, Logan transitioned to the relay races. The men's Old Sun team consists of her dad Allison Red Crow and her brothers Racey Big Snake, Mark Big Tobacco, and JJ Red Gun as the holders. There are also multiple riders who race for Old Sun; this includes Cody Big Tobacco, Ian Big Tobacco, and Logan Red Crow herself. In spite of the mens relay team, Allison let his daughter Logan form her own relay team where she is the rider, the ladies team also includes her two setters; Lenna Little Plume and Kali Pretty Young Man.

Logan was raised on the Three Sun's Ranch located in Many Bears Flats on the South East part of Siksika. The ranch consists of cattle and horses that sparked her interest in equine sports. Logan has always taken horse racing into consideration, and always knew she wanted to become a jockey "I'm not very tall; I'm only 5'3 and I've always seen

jockeys that are tiny, so I always wanted to be a jockey whenever I saw the races," said Logan in an interview with Siksika Media. Logan would travel to rodeo's to support her dad Allison in the bareback riding, at that time the relay races were introduced to Canada in 2009. Her mom was also a big supporter, as she helped her get into races. Logan always mentioned how she wanted to get into the races, so when the time came, her mom was the one who got her into it.

Right now, since there are not many female relay riders that participate in Canada, Logan has to travel in the U.S.A. quite often. In turn, since 2019 she has been travelling to the States to race. In the states, there is an association called the Horse Nations Indian Relay Council. They host a tour having multiple relay racing events throughout the year, and at the end of the relay racing season, there is a final race called the Championship of Champions held usually in Casper, Wyoming. Logan has been looking to achieve the Championship of Champions title. The first time that she went, she placed 7th, and in 2021 Logan ended up getting 2nd overall, coming close to victory. Logan did make it back to the Championship of Champions this year. She expressed in an interview how challenging it was to get into the championship heat, however the Old Sun ladies team qualified for the final heat at the event but

got disqualified because she fell off her horse and broke her ankle. In consideration, it is quite difficult for Logan to attend the last few races towards the end of the season; this is because she is working towards another goal of hers, which is attending the University of Calgary to get her nursing degree and become a travel nurse. She wants this because, with travelling around doing relay racing, she is finding that travelling is a passion of hers; in turn, with her becoming a travel nurse, she can pursue this passion with her nursing career.

In conclusion, Logan Red Crow is a very good role model for the community and for young Black-foot women. She is setting a good example by pursuing her goals and putting in the hard work to achieve them. Logan also had a few words to share with young people who are aspiring to achieve their goals. "Always remember why you started; don't lose sight of your dream; you can achieve anything, and the sky is the limit when it comes to your goals," said Logan ●

## Cameron McMaster on Becoming a Division 1 College Basketball player

Siksika Nation is the home of 17-year-old Cameron Apiikisstakai McMaster. Cameron's family has a long history of McMaster athletes. She is the daughter of Donna McMaster and Lawrence McMaster, the granddaughter of Don and Jean Ingwersen on her mother's side, and the granddaughter of Laverna McMaster, Wayne Crochane, and Samuel Born with a tooth, who was born to her father's side. She is also Levitt and Ann McMaster's great-granddaughter. Cameron has grown up surrounded by sports due to her family, since both her mom and grandmother, Laverna, played collegiate basketball.

Cameron is an Orangeville basketball player in the Ontario Basketball Athletic Association (OSBA). She made the all-Canadian Nike Future Athletes squad, formerly known as the Biosteel Game and was named a second team all-star the previous season. Although Cameron's season is only getting started, her team's run to the



divisional championship last year was a huge success. At present, Cameron attends Orangeville Prep Academy, situated in Ontario, Canada. She wouldn't change the fact that she

had to relocate across the nation to accomplish her ambition, even if it took a lot. Cameron will be playing Division 1 basketball and studying psychology at the University of Detroit Mercy starting in the fall. Cameron one day wants to play professionally in European leagues. She would love to continue working in the sports industry when her basketball career is over and use her degree in psychology to assist athletes in managing their mental health while continuing to play their favorite sport.

"Basketball has taken me to so many places and to live in Europe while still playing the sport I love would be the best of both worlds."

Cameron McMaster on her career goal. "I feel extremely proud to represent Siksika Nation; our community is full of strong and

resilient people and to be able to show that to people outside of Alberta is an honor. It is important that our youth from Siksika to be able to see someone

like them achieve their goal, and it would encourage more kids to reach for their dreams and aspirations.”

Cameron McMaster on how she felt about representing Siksika Nation. “My best advice for someone who is starting basketball is to keep your mind on your goal. If you want something, take the risk and go and get it; you will end up regretting it if you don’t. Remember that your career is not always going to be uphill and that it is okay to have bad days, those all lead to your end goal. Most importantly, use your family as your motivation, they are your support system and don’t be afraid to fall back on them when you need help.”

Cameron McMaster on giving advice to the youth and someone that would want to end up playing at a higher level in basketball.

Congratulations Cameron on your achievements so far and good luck to you and your basketball career, Siksika is always here and will always cheer you on! ●

# Bison Harvest on Siksika

## A RETURN TO TRADITIONAL PRACTICE

On October 30, 2024, the Siksikai'powahsin program held its first major event, marking a significant cultural and educational milestone. A bison was brought back to Siksika, where it was butchered and prepared as part of a hands-on cultural learning experience. Participants of the program gained a deeper understanding of the traditional uses of every part of the bison, along with the Blackfoot language related to the animal, its uses, and its various parts.

The event was spearheaded by Kent Ayoungman, with support from Tribal Manager Richard Sparvier, whose combined efforts made the gathering possible. Kent's program focuses on preserving the Siksika Nation language and sacred cultural practices, ensuring that these traditions are passed down to future generations.

Held in a park near the Siksika Nation Tribal Administration band office, the event featured a tipi that served as a ceremonial meeting space. Inside, attendees participated in a prayer led by an elder and engaged in discussions about the significance of the day's activities. Local Siksika knowledge keepers and elders

provided invaluable cultural insights as the bison preparation unfolded. Members of the Siksika Nation Council, including Chief Ouray Crowfoot, attended and shared their thoughts on the importance of the event.

Tribal Manager Richard Sparvier expressed his pride in the event's success, stating: "It's a proud day for us and the Nation that we're able to do something like this for the community. There's a lot of individuals who are coming by and just stopping in, elders who are coming by and stopping in, and overall, it feels like a great day."

The bison preparation event exemplifies the Siksikai'powahsin program's commitment to cultural preservation and community engagement. By integrating traditional practices with language education, the program not only revitalizes important knowledge but also fosters a sense of unity and pride within the Siksika Nation. Events like this are vital steps in ensuring that sacred traditions and teachings remain vibrant for generations to come.

## Trinity Pretty Young Man

### On Acting, Understanding and Storytelling

Trinity Pretty Young Man is a young Blackfoot woman aspiring and striving towards a lot of good things in the community. She is a grade 12-17-year-old student who attends Strathmore High School. She comes from the Pretty Young Man and Water Chief Family, and her traditional Blackfoot name is Anataki, meaning “pretty girl.” This was given to her by her great-grandmother, Reverent Margaret Water Chief. Trinity is many things and has many various achievements and skills she has; she is an athlete, actor, director, and filmmaker.

Those are just a few to mention as she is also the Strathmore Highschool Princess, and Chief.

Currently, Trinity is a part of a production that is called “New Blood.” It is a theatre production that blends Blackfoot culture, dance, and history with western poetry, music, and contemporary. The production covers the story of Chief Vincent Yellow Old Woman, and follows the path of Truth and Reconciliation. Trinity played the role of several people in this production, such as Vincent himself, her parents, grandparents, and children who did not make it home. With the play being for high school students, Trinity started as a background dancer in grade 9. The following year, she was then asked to play the lead role, with that being “The Child.” She had to read and memorize a 6-minute poem during the summer going into her grade 10 year. In turn, this allowed Trinity to travel all over, bringing her and the production to Saskatoon, Winnipeg, and across Alberta.

With the success of the “New Blood” dance production, a documentary

was asked to be filmed with CBC Gem, which Trinity was a part of and helped film. Directed by Adam Solway and Austin Ladouceur, filming began in February of this year, and the episode was released to stream on CBC Gem on November 22nd.

Trinity also expressed how much she learned from the production

in an interview, explaining how it has affected her in a way where it brought a lot of understanding of what happened during the time when residential schools were still very common.

“It showed me how to deal with my own personal healing and reconciliation,” said Trinity in an interview with Siksika Media.

Trinity is also a big advocate for Truth and Reconciliation. Even when she was in the fourth grade, she was pushing for and speaking about it at non-Native schools. With the help of New Blood, it is also helping her get a voice and to show people who go and watch the play what Truth and Reconciliation is about. It is not about trying to prove people wrong; it’s about educating and showing what has happened to Native people in the past and building relationships. She also spoke about how the production changed not only herself but others around her about Truth and Reconciliation.

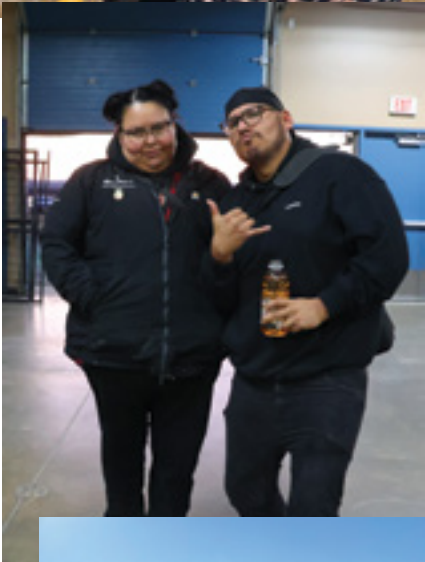
“I’ve been across Alberta with the play, and I’ve gone to a lot of schools. Teachers at these schools get it; they get it when they see the play. It’s not about just the kids getting it; it’s about the adults getting it as well,” said Trinity in an interview.

In turn, Trinity is a very good role model for young aspiring Blackfoot women in the community. She has many achievements and strives towards doing good things for herself and Siksika. She is an athlete, actor, director, and filmmaker. Trinity has also left closing remarks for young people in Siksika.

“You need to go and talk to your grandparents; you need to go and learn from them because they love you. Some grandparents don’t say that they love you because they got lost coming from residential schools; they got abused; they lost that love, but your grandparents are the ones that loved you before you were born. To the Blackfoot youth out there, talk to your grandparents,” said Trinity ●
